PRINCE FELIPE'S Speech:

"We are very pleased to be here honoring the establishment of the Spanish foundation of Santa Fe through this 400th celebration, where two nations celebrate today and commemorate our shared history. Also, it is important to bring to you all the greetings from the King and Queen. Thanks to everyone who worked hard to bring this celebration together. We share the pride with Santa Fe on this occasion, as the U.S., New Mexico and Spain are close family and allies. It is a privilege to participate in Spain's participation with this Nation. This allows us to remember the

past and look together to the future. It is an opportunity to recall the names of Juan de Onate, Pedro de Peralta, Don Diego de Vargas, and so many others whose names are still used here commonly, today. They all deserve our respect for their contributions, misgivings and achievements from which we all have learned. There are also those we remember, who have contributed to modern New Mexico. Across centuries we are reminded of Spain's presence here and Spain's legacy."

"Just a few years ago, the Queen and King of Spain celebrated the 450 years of the founding of Pensacola with pride, where it is called the "first place." In a few years will the celebration of the 450 year of the founding of San Augustine be held in 2015; and soon the 500th year of Ponce de Leons arrival on the Coast of Florida in 2013. Many more celebrations will surely follow, because of our intertwining historic experiences."

"I have fond memories of my past participation here in 2000 in our celebration with descendents of our Native Indians. Spain is the European Country with the longest standing presence here. When the Spanish founded Santa Fe, it was named Santa Fe de los Españoles, de San Francisco de Assisi, a reminder of the Spanish language being now a major world language, and the 3rd most used on the Internet today."

The apathy from the media/press, and government agencies towards the Hispanic Community was apparent during the visit from Spain's Crown Prince Felipe and Princess Letizia of Asturias; whose visit included dedication of the prestigious Cervantes Institute at the National Hispanic Cultural Center's, Domenici Education Building. The Cervantes Institute is located in only twenty countries in the world. The Prince also received a report on



the Endowed Chair at the University of New Mexico on Computer Science and Electronics, which is named in his honor and funded by private Spanish sources.

They honored us by "kicking off" the 400th Santa Fe Celebration on Tuesday, October 6, 2009. The Prince is the heir apparent to his Majesty Juan Carlos I of Spain. The absence of the Governor at the 400th "kick off" at the NM History Museum and Plaza, created a void. Also obvious was the blatant absence of the Media. Most of the press coverage was from Spain or of the Spanish speaking media, only our KRQE and MÁS New Mexico gave front coverage. One would never know that New Mexico had a 47% Hispanic Population, by the attention given this Royal visit for the 400th Spanish Founding of Santa Fe. Is it insignificant that we were a Province of Spain for over 200 years, of which thousands of descendents are included in the 47% Hispanic Population of New Mexico?

We all know had it been a movie star, big name politician, North Korea delegates, Royalty from any other country, we would have had up front coverage. Even the recent visit of past Mexican President Fox generated more press coverage.

Prince Felipe's Opening 400th Ceremony Speech

"New Mexico reflects the use of the language and culture of Spain, as practiced today; where Spain brought the ranching culture, which became the West, the horse, city planning, architecture, ownership of land, organized government and Western Civilization and Christianity.

Here at the N.M. History Museum, it is important to see our History. Also, the National Hispanic Cultural Center in Albuquerque, is important to the preservation of Spanish culture and history."

"Inevitably one must also speak about the Camino Real de Tierra Adentro, the 1600 mile route between Mexico City and Santa Fe, which provided exchange of commerce, but also the all important exchange of ideas which was allowed because of this much used trail. Also one must remember that when Spain developed its Constitution in 1812, New Mexican Spaniards met in Cadiz, and requested many things for consideration. Our continued ties are even demonstrated by the Endowed Spanish Chair for Science and Technology at the UNM."

"This 400th Celebration too highlights the US and Spain's partnership and close friendship we share in many responsibilities in this complex world. We are encouraged to work together to develop economic growth, profile democracy, and share resources. Today there are Spanish Companies in many States, as there are US companies in Spain. The cover of the October issue of Local Flavor features the artisans who have created a contemplative atmosphere in the newly refurbished St. Frances Hotel: Jeff Smith-Ironsmith, Orae Dominguez-Tinsmith, Kris Lajeskie-Designer, Hotelier-Jim Long, Estevan Garcia-Chef, and Leonel Capparelli-Furniture maker.

In the story by Pari Taichert hotel owner Jim Long speaks of preserving New Mexico's unique culture in how he presents to visitors different aspects of New Mexico from the Amerindian look of Nativo Lodge in Albuquerque, to the chapel at the Lodge in Santa Fe with its Santero inspired chapel and alter by Artist, Dr. Charlie Carrillo.

The theme Mr. Long used for the St. Frances Hotel, the oldest in Santa Fe is of the Journey by the Franciscans to help establish, Santa Fe de los Españoles y de San Francisco de Assisi, NM, from Assisi, Italy to Madrid, Spain on land donated to St. Francis by the family of New Mexico Governor Don Diego de Vargas and on to Santa Fe, NM. Jim Long's uncle Father Jerome is also a part of Santa Fe's 400 year old presence of St. Frances de Assisi's humble teachings in Santa Fe, NM.

The occasion for the split between the Church of England and the Roman Catholic Church was King Henry VIII's request to Rome that his marriage to Catherine of Aragon be annulled. Pope Clement VII refused his request, so the king divorced her and declared himself head of the church in England.

The tension between the king and the pope took place while the Protestant Reformation was in full swing in Europe, dividing the Western church between those who recognized the authority of the pope as it was being exercised and those who did not.

In the newly independent Church of England, pastors and theologians adopted and contributed to some of the key aspects of the Protestant reform, including an emphasis on the importance of the Bible, gradual use of the vernacular for liturgy and an emphasis on collegial decision-making. But the Church of England also maintained many traditions held in common with the Catholic Church, especially in the liturgy and in church structure. Given their history, Anglicans often describe their church as both Catholic and reformed

The Anglecian provience in the United States is the Episcopal Church.
